

Before society was an actual thing and people lived in large numbers, we lived in small groups of nomadic Hunter-Gatherers, where we would gather food by hunting animals and gathering fruits that grew naturally. The reason they lived in such low populations was because of the food situation, and because they had no housing for people to live in, considering they would move around so much; they also lacked the technology to live in large groups. Seeing how some groups of Hunter-Gatherers never progressed, they eventually had to grow in population, but not too much, just a tad; as their population grew, so did the land they would take up to scope out the land for resources.
